MTC Ledang arrives at Ophir field

Commissioning activities underway following arrival of FPSO at Malaysian oilfield development

The floating production, storage and offloading vessel for the Ophir oilfield development has arrived on location off the coast of Malaysia.

Field co-owner Octanex revealed Monday that mooring lines had already been attached to the MTC Ledang FPSO, while the flowline between the vessel and the field's wellhead platform had also been installed and tested.

The MTC Engineering-owned FPSO is on a three-year contract, with an option for a one-year extension, and has the capacity for 15,000 barrels of fluid per day and gas flaring, and can store up to 300,000 barrels of crude.

Commissioning activities are now underway at the Ophir field which lies in a water depth of roughly 70 metres and is being developed under a risk service contract by Octanex (50%), Scomi Energy (30%) and Vestigo Petroleum (20%).
